## **Pattern**

Notes:

dc cluster – Create a cluster of three double crochet stitches in the same stitch.

Directions:

Begin with Raspberry yarn and chain 63.

*Row 1:* Start by working 1 double crochet into the third chain. *Skip 2 stitches, work a dc cluster into the next stitch* across. Repeat this sequence 18 more times (for a total of 19 clusters). Conclude with 2 double crochet stitches in the last chain. Chain 2 and turn.

*Row 2:* Craft a dc cluster into the first space between the clusters on the previous row. Repeat this for the entire row (a total of 20 clusters). Finish with a single double crochet into the top of the ch-2 at the end of the row. Cut the yarn and weave in the loose ends.

*Row 3:* Attach white yarn with a slip stitch. Chain 2, and work 1 double crochet in the same space. Proceed to create dc clusters in all the spaces. Add 2 double crochet stitches into the top of the ch-2 at the end of the row. Chain 2 and turn. (19 clusters created)

*Row 4:* Continue to work dc clusters in all the spaces across. Complete the row with a single double crochet into the top of the ch-2 at the end. Cut the yarn and secure the loose ends. (20 clusters in total). Repeat rows three and four 18 more times.

Your stripe pattern will consist of two rows of Raspberry, two rows of White, and two rows of Mint, repeating until you reach a total of 22 rows.

#### *Optional Picot Border:*

*Round 1:* Single crochet around the entire blanket, working 3 single crochets into each corner stitch. Cut the yarn and weave in the loose ends.

*Round 2:* Join the second border color and single crochet around the entire blanket once more, working 3 single crochets into each corner stitch. Cut the yarn and secure the loose ends.

*Round 3:* Attach white yarn. You will now create a picot edging. Join the yarn, *single crochet in the next five stitches, chain 3, half-double crochet in the first chain* around. You can adjust the
